Grants and Awards:

• Team Grant: Transitions in Care

CIHR recently launched this <u>Team Grant</u> that will provide research funds to "implement, evaluate, spread, and scale pragmatic solutions to problems associated with transitions in care from a clinical, health care or health system perspective". First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Peoples are considered key populations of interest. Please contact <u>Tessa Cheng</u> in SPARC if you are interested in applying.

The application deadline is January 24, 2018.

Operating Grant: Transitions in Care – Evaluation Grants

These two-year grants provide funds to "formally evaluate, validate and/or demonstrate the effectiveness, appropriateness and/or impact of implemented transitions in care activities to create high-quality, real-world evidence, relevant to transitions in care, overall health and/or health system improvement." Approximately 16 grants will be awarded with a maximum of \$200,000 per grant. First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Peoples are considered key populations of interest. Please contact Tessa Cheng in SPARC if you are interested in applying.

The application deadline is February 5, 2019.

• New! Team Grant: Indigenous Component of Healthy Life

Trajectories (I-HeLTI)CIHR recently launched this <u>Team Grant</u> that will "build the infrastructure and capacity" needed to conduct an intervention cohort research study that aligns with CIHR's <u>Healthy Life Trajectories Initiative</u> and "Developmental Origins of Health and Disease (DOHaD)" approach. The application deadline is May 1, 2019.

New! Operating Grant: Network Environments for Indigenous

Health Research (NEIHR)CIHR recently launched this <u>Operating Grant</u> that will establish a national network of nine regional/provincial centres (and one national coordinating centre). These centres will be "focused on capacity development, research and knowledge translation (KT) centred on Indigenous Peoples (i.e., First Nations, Inuit and Métis)." CIHR will fund one centre in British Columbia with up to \$10.5 million for 5 years (with the possibility of two renewals of 5 years each). The application deadline is June 4, 2019.

NEW: MITACS Accelerate Grants

MITACS Accelerate Grants are available to students, businesses, non-profit organizations and First Nations. Grants start at \$15,000 to support a student, a supervising professor, and a partner organization in a four to eight month internship. Partner organizations' financial contribution begins at \$7,500. Mitacs Accelerate Fellowships provide longer-term funding and internship options for master's and PhD students and begin at \$60,000 for master's students for 2-year projects and \$120,000 for PhD students for 4-year projects, with financial contributions from partners of \$30,000 and \$60,000 respectively. 
CIHR Strategic Grants
